# Catholic Charities Voice of Hope Awards 2005

## GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

**Award Mission:** To recognize an individual, a parish and a Catholic institution demonstrating excellence, creativity and leadership in charity and justice on behalf of disadvantaged people.

**Eligibility/Guidelines:** All nominees (individual, parish or institution) must be located in and affiliated with the Catholic Diocese of Youngstown.

- Individual nominees must serve in a volunteer capacity. They cannot be paid employees of a parish or institution.
- Parish or institution nominees must demonstrate the involvement of a “group effort” in meeting a need or challenge in their community.
- Former Voice of Hope Award nominees *are* eligible for re-nomination.
- Former Voice of Hope Award winners *are not* eligible for subsequent awards *unless* the individual, parish or institution is nominated for an effort unrelated to their previous award.

**Standards for Selection:** One winner will be chosen from each of the three categories (individual, parish, institution). Award recipients will be selected according to the following criteria:

- nominee’s achievements and leadership
- nominee’s efforts to support and/or assist the ministries/agencies of Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Youngstown
- nominee’s dedication to his/her/their cause
- impact of the nominee’s efforts on his/her/their community and/or the Diocese of Youngstown

**Selection:** Nominees will be individuals, parishes and institutions connected to the Catholic Church who exhibit excellence, creativity and leadership in charity and justice on behalf of disadvantaged people. An ad hoc committee will review the nomination materials and rank each nominee according to the Standards for Selection listed above. Top recommendations from each category will be submitted to the Executive Director of Catholic Charities for his consideration. The Executive Director will then forward the final choices to the Bishop/Administrator for review and approval.

**All completed Voice of Hope Award nomination forms are due by Friday, July 29, 2005.**

July 3, 2005 (14<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

“Let all Your works give You thanks, O Lord, and let Your faithful ones bless You,” says the Psalmist. Stewardship is this “attitude of gratitude” for the many gifts God has given us.

July 17, 2005 (16<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

Good stewards in a parish are like the yeast in today’s Gospel. Their selfless gifts of time and talent help the parish grow and thrive, and their example inspires others to become good stewards, too.

July 31, 2005 (18<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

In today’s Gospel, Jesus feeds the five thousand with five loaves and two fish. The message of stewardship is that God’s gifts, *shared*, will always be more than enough.

August 7, 2005 (19<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

In today’s first reading, Elijah recognized the voice of God not in the strong and heavy wind, not in the earthquake, and not in the fire, but in a tiny whispering sound. May we find enough quiet in our clamorous world to hear His voice and discern what He asks of us.

August 21, 2005 (21<sup>st</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

In today’s readings, St. Paul reminds the Romans-and us-that all things come from God: “For from Him and through Him and for Him all things are.” Good stewards understand that *all* is gift and share generously the gifts of time, talent and treasure from which they have been blessed.

July 10, 2005 (15<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

May our stewardship of time, talent, and treasure show us to be among those who have heard the message of Christ and taken it in, yielding a hundred-or sixty- or thirty-fold.

July 24, 2005 (17<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)  
STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

“The law of Your mouth is to me more precious than thousands of gold and silver pieces,” says the Psalmist today. Does the amount of my offering suggest that I could honestly say the same?

August 14, 2005 (20<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time)

In today’s second reading, St. Paul tells the Romans, “God’s gifts and his call are irrevocable.” To what is God calling me today? What gifts are mine to share?
